When we attended the Chapter BC-D meeting in early November we had a chance to sit with Ian and Kathy McAlpine. During our conversation Kathy mentioned that she had enjoyed reading about our various trips. We'd got away from reporting on them because we weren't sure there was much interest. So.....based on Kathy's comment, this article will be a review of a recent trip to Charleston, South Carolina.

The trip, a combination of business and pleasure, took place over the November 3/4th weekend. We flew out of Vancouver on Friday November 2 via Continental Airlines. The trip took us first to Houston where we had a 4-hour layover and then on to Charleston. As with almost all airline trips these days the food was great – provided you had just spent a week in the dessert with no sustenance at all. Continental does have the newest fleet in the airline industry and our flight to Houston was on a 737-800 – very nice plane.

The layover in Houston was a drag. There is little to do and, once we had consumed our pub meal, such as it was, it was a matter of killing time. The flight to Charleston was on an Embrauer commuter jet. A great jet – feels like you are going at the speed of sound but takes forever to get anywhere. Okay, but after 2 ½ hours in the dark you just want it to end.

We had planned on getting a rental car in Charleston

The houses fronted on to a side yard. Balconies looked out on well-kept front gardens. At the street a false door secured access to the balconies. Someone entering the home would first ring the bell at the street, enter through the false door on to the lower balcony and then enter the home through the real front door. The homes were long and narrow.

Charleston is next to being on the Atlantic Ocean. It is between two rivers and has the second largest container port on the eastern seaboard. Many of the outgoing vessels contain Mercedes cars on their way to Germany. Fort Sumter sits in the confluence of the two rivers and, a key military location during the civil war, is now a tourist attraction.

We found downtown Charleston to be clean and colourful. Part of its history is Hurricane Hugo that caused a great deal of damage. Many roofs and indeed whole buildings had to be restored after Hugo went through. Shopping is confined to a significant number of small shops. Saks 5th Avenue is the only store of significant size in the downtown core.

As part of the business portion of the trip the Sunday night dinner took place in a building across the street from the hotel. We walked across the street to a restored theatre where we sat in theatre seats as a number of presentations and short talks took place. We were all wondering where dinner was to be and assumed that it would be back at the hotel. As the speeches concluded the curtains behind the stage opened to reveal a dining room, fully prepared, with waiters at the ready. An orchestra began playing. It was a tremendous evening – great food, great service, and good company.

Across the street from the hotel was the Charleston Market. Four blocks long, the building was filled with vendors selling everything from T-shirts to sterling silver jewelry to sweet grass baskets. The latter are a local specialty taking a number of days to complete.

The cost, \$35 US and up, was a bit steep for us given our limited duty free allowance so we passed on those. The market is open every day but it seemed that about 10% of the merchants took weekdays off.

Our visit ended Tuesday mid afternoon when we returned to the airport. For most of the way to the airport the driver was trying to guide his daughter-in-law to Charleston. She was in a town some 40 miles away and thoroughly lost. She also had difficulty following directions so it made for an interesting one-sided conversation.

The flight home was inconsequential. Even less food but no layover in Houston this time. In fact we were late leaving Charleston and had to run for the connection in Houston. We were sure our baggage wouldn't make it but it did. Hurray for Continental. The flight from Houston was only about 1/3 full so it was comfortable.

While the flight to these meetings is generally okay with the mental and other preparations that must be done, the flight home is long, boring and seemingly endless. All you want to do is get home.

Never the less, Charleston is one place we would like to return to. Its history is interesting and worthy of study. We saw a number of touring bikes, GW's included and thought how great it would be to be riding. Our tour guide commented on the number of bikes around Charleston when Daytona Bike Week is on.

And so there lies our latest trip. We hope you enjoyed reading about it.

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
