In Memoriam

John Plant

1931 - 2002

On Tuesday June 11, 2002 GWRRA Chapter BC-A lost part of its heart. John Plant passed away in hospital after suffering a heart attack. John was a long time member of GWRRA and Chapter BC-A with a membership number in the 17,000 series.

Every organization has one or two members whom all other members look to as the class of the organization. These individuals exhibit a steadiness that others rely on; contribute to the organization in many and mostly silent ways; and carry the organization beyond its boundaries to the general public. John was one of those individuals. He truly was looked upon as the class of Chapter BC-A.

John's interests in motorcycling and community activities went well beyond normal chapter activities. John was a founding member of the Canadian Wings and Pacific Wings. He was an active member of the drill team, showing his and others skills throughout the Pacific Northwest. In more recent years, as a member of the Pacific Wings, John organized motorcycle security groups for the Abbotsford Air Show; organized motorcycle escort patrols for the Penticton Iron Man; and arranged for motorcycles at almost any event that needed them.

Those of you who took part in BC-A's June 2 Fun Run met John at Checkpoint #2 on Burnaby Mountain (a task he has done for many years) and again at the final checkpoint in Tsawwassen. John looked after the chapter phone tree, volunteering to do so when no one else volunteered. Some 4 years ago Chapter BC-A presented John with a Humanitarian Award for assistance he quietly provided to other members of the chapter.

John was also very actively involved in Community Policing in Burnaby. He joined in patrols every weekend, again doing it quietly and with little recognition.

To Helen and the family we extend our heartfelt sympathies and best wishes. We truly understand the magnitude of your loss.

The only description of the accident is that a car pulled out in front of both riders. They were enroute to the Chapter WA-S Victoria Days event in Ephrata. Our sincere condolences go the families of all involved.

Please be extra careful this riding season. Drive for everyone else on the road.

On May 26th, Chapters BC-A, C, and D will be riding to Squamish for a picnic. This ride will take the place of our regular May meeting. By the time you read this you will either be getting ready to leave the abc for Squamish or will be in Squamish enjoying a picnic. VICTORIA DAYS WEEKEND

Nothing better than greeting old friends and hanging out with them. Received our registration packages and checked the contents.

Saturday morning was open house at Chet's Honda in Quincy. Everybody goes over to kick tires, look at all the latest goodies, chrome, helmets, bikes, etc. Chet's always hands out a few prizes and a ticket had to be put in the box at the store. As a result of the bad accident mentioned by Barry in his editorial, families had been contacted and they asked that a fund be set up to provide financial help immediately in case of future severe accidents. It was very rewarding to see Regions, Districts and Chapters vying with one another to make major

contributions to this fund. Individual contributions from members present when a basket was passed around was also very significant. To add to this the band donated half of the receipts of the "78" CDs that people bought. If something good has to come out of something bad this was it.

Regional J Director Jim Carey spoke about the people killed in the accident. One of the members of the Christian Motorcycle Association prayed for the friends we had lost. It was back to the campsite for "pies". For those who haven't been initiated into Chapter S pies, two pieces of white bread are buttered on one side, then you proceed to where an array of pie fillings, puddings, chocolate and butterscotch chips, Reeses pieces, coconut, cut up strawberries, and so on. You make a selection, better be three or more or you hear "b-o-o-o-ring! The other piece of bread is put on top then they are put in a sandwich iron and toasted on each side on a stove. The resulting toasted confection is very yummy, no matter what the combination.

Sunday morning was Poker Run time. Donna and Willie Buckshaw, and myself and Doris in the truck were first out. It was a very scenic ride in a loop that extended up towards Highway 2, taking in a place called Pine Canyon, very twisty turny road through a rugged rock setting. Instead of drawing cards at checkpoints we drew numbered chips. None of us hit the high numbers but it was a very enjoyable run. At 2.30pm. Draws were made, door prizes collected and prizes given out. Ronnie reported this had been the best attendance so far. Sad to report we came home empty-handed. We could learn a lot from crayons: some are sharp, some are pretty, some are dull, some have weird names, and all are different colors....but they all exist very nicely in the same box.

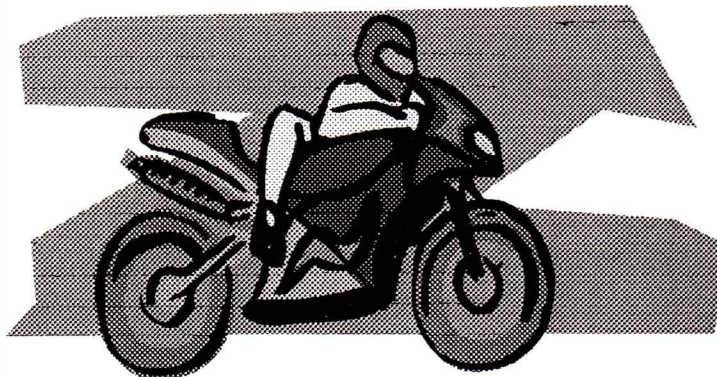
